WHAT IS THIS GUIDE?

- This is an Academic Planning Guide, prepared by the Student Connect Centre to help you register for courses towards your desired program at the University of Alberta (UofA).
- RDP Specializes in the following disciplines: Anthropology, Communication Studies, Economics, English, History, Philosophy, Political Science, Psychology and Sociology.
- Please note that the first two years of a Bachelor of Arts (BA) is generally transferable to any post-secondary institution in Alberta, but there will be notable differences. If you would like to transfer to a post-secondary outside of the University of Alberta, please ensure that you are consulting with that institution about their admission requirements and transfer policies.
- If you are transferring to another institution to complete your program, we strongly advise that you read the Academic Calendar of your destination institution for full information.

WHAT IS A TERM? TERMS ARE THE PERIOD IN WHICH YOUR STUDIES TAKE PLACE. AT RDP, WE OFFER FOUR TERMS.

- **Fall** term (September through December)
- **Winter** term (January through April)
- **Spring** term (May through June): Spring term is an optional, condensed term. Course offerings are limited.

- **Summer** term (July through August): Summer term is an optional, condensed term. Course offerings are limited.

HOW MANY COURSES SHOULD I TAKE A TERM?

- The maximum number of courses you can take in the Fall or Winter terms is 5 courses and 2 courses in the Spring (optional).
- To complete your program in four years, you would need to take the maximum number of courses per term (5 courses in the Fall and 5 courses in the Winter), or 10 course per year. Some students will complete 10 courses in a year by taking 4 courses in the Fall, 4 courses in the Winter, and 2 courses in the Spring (or a combination thereof).
- We encourage you to find the best course load for you to be successful in your courses and your program! However, we encourage you to check the course load requirements for your destination university and degree.
- When determining your course load keep your funding in mind, if applicable. For course load requirements for funding purposes, please visit www.rdpolytech.ca/psfunding.

WHAT HAPPENS IF I TAKE LESS THAN THE RECOMMENDED COURSE LOAD?

- You may need an extra term or year to complete your program.

WHAT IF I COMPLETED COURSES AT ANOTHER POST-SECONDARY INSTITUTION?

Once you are admitted to RDP, you can then apply to have your post-secondary courses assessed for transfer credit through our [Recognition of Prior Learning Office](#). Once admitted to RDP you can complete an [RPL application form](#), provide the Polytechnic Assessors with any and all transcripts, course outlines/descriptions, or other documentation necessary to support your PLAR application.

NOTE: Universities have what is called a *residency requirement*. This means that a specific number of credits must be completed as their student to grant their degree. The University of Alberta (and most post-secondary institutions) require a minimum of 60 credits to be completed while registered as a student at their institution. Therefore, **students can transfer up to a maximum of 60 credits** (20 three-credit courses) in this program to the University of Alberta.

 - c. Each institution will use different numbering conventions for their years

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TRANSFER INFORMATION (UNIVERSITY OF ALBERTA)

- At UAlberta, there are Common Requirements that all BA students will need to satisfy as part of their degree. While it is recommended to complete these requirements prior to transfer, they are graduation requirements, not transfer requirements. Any of these requirements not completed at RDP, will be completed upon transfer.
- **Junior English: 3 credits (1 course)**
 - ENGL 219 will meet this requirement at RDC.
- **Language other than English (LOE): 6 credits (2 courses)**
 - Students need to complete two courses in one language other than English (e.g. two French courses or two Spanish courses).
 - RDP only offers French courses. Students wishing to take different languages can complete this requirement upon transfer.
 - UAlberta will waive the LOE for any student who has successfully completed a Language other than English at the 30-level.
- **Non-Arts courses: 6 credits (2 courses)**
 - Students must complete 6 credits in courses offered by Faculties other than Arts (i.e. Science, Kinesiology, Education, or Business).
 - Economics majors will satisfy this requirement simply by completing their major, as Math 202/203 and STAT 251 are Science courses.
